The IDF is charging into space in order to be ready for challenges expected in future wars, IDF Technology and Digital Chief Brig.-Gen. Yael Grosman told The Jerusalem Post in a recent exclusive interview.

Regarding the significance of space as the next great battlefield of war, she said, “There is a data revolution. We need to bring data and capabilities that the IDF needs everywhere, not just regarding the war that was, but the war that will be. This means we need to be organized differently.”

She explained that Israel understands it cannot compete on future battlefields without a robust approach to space that will fully cover all the worlds of data and content.

Referring to IDF Chief of Staff Eyal Zamir’s mid-January five-year plan for the future of the IDF and its highlighting of space, Grosman stated, “The IDF chief said we cannot ignore space.

“We are receiving lots of energy and resources to pursue our interests in space since his declaration,” she continued.

While Israel began space-related programs around 45 years ago, Grosman noted, the country has come a long way in both satellite communications and satellite surveillance.

The Defense Ministry has supported her argument on this, announcing that it took over 12,000 photos of Iran during the 12-day June 2025 operation and over 50,000 photos during the 2026 Iran war.

According to Grosman, the new satellite communications technology has also been a huge part of how the air force can operate its fresh big data capabilities so far away from Israel's borders.

In the future, she said Israel will need to and will be able to launch multiple payloads for satellites to hold and relay even larger data transfers, as well as new tasks in space.

With the Post noting that Russia, China, and Iran have all worked on ways to attack, damage, jam, or drag satellites in space, Grosman responded, "There are threats from space. We work with people who have a lot of power at the Defense Ministry and with the broader defense establishment. We can all bring forward achievements," Grosman said.

She preferred not to address the question of having a separate new space command, which the US established in 2019. Rather, Grosman said that what was important was a mechanism to include all the different pieces of Israel's space ecosystem.

This would ensure that, whether work is needed on communications, surveillance, the electromagnetic spectrum, attacking and defending satellites (more and more countries are working on this aspect), or new engineering techniques to increase satellite payloads, all efforts are maximized and coordinated.

Grosman also sees the future of space warfare as a major realm in which she has a significant hand in managing for the IDF.

Electromagnetic spectrum

In December 2025, the IDF reorganized its C4I and Cyber Defense Directorate, with a new AI-focused brigade and an expanded electronic warfare apparatus that enhanced the military's defensive cyber capabilities, including against drone attacks.

Sfeira is the name of the new brigade responsible for electromagnetic spectrum issues, among other things.

According to sources, actions related to the spectrum are among the most underreported stories of the recent Iran war, with major implications in both Tehran and Lebanon.

Over the course of the June 2025 war with Iran, around 25% of 1,100 drones launched at Israel were taken out by the 5114th Spectrum Warfare Battalion, which operates electronic warfare capabilities, according to IDF officials.

Since the reorganization, for the first time, four out of five brigadier generals running full brigade-size units are women, of whom Grosman is the most senior as the top deputy to the head of Communications and Technology commander Maj.-Gen. Aviad Dagan.

Impact on Operation Roaring Lion

In the months leading up to February 28, the IDF was on close to a war footing when it came to Grosman's Communications Command as it could be.

In many ways, even though around eight months passed between both events, Operation Roaring Lion was an extension or round two of the June 2025 war between the parties involved.

"We learned many lessons about fighting a war with Iran from Operation Rising Lion. We learned a new approach to utilizing military force, focusing on certain specific areas of warfare and information," Grosman said.

"This allowed us to achieve dozens of percentages of new war-related solutions," she explained, while keeping some of the classified lessons confidential.

Other top IDF officials told the Post that the air force had struck 2,600 critical targets in Iran's defense industries during the 2026 war.

When the air force hunted such a monumental volume of targets, it relied on a digital platform that Grosman's brigade had provided.

"We are building and operating the IDF's information factory. The Communications Command already had a data center and databases. Now the air force, military intelligence, and the ground forces have their own databases under regulation and are using digital architecture, which will lead to increasing the IDF's effectiveness and better use of the data," Grosman said.

During Operations Rising Lion and Roaring Lion, Grosman's brigade was able to collect and transfer (via communications platforms) substantial amounts of data over long distances such that "we made the third circle [of countries at a far distance] the same as the first circle [countries on Israel's border]."

"There is no magic. You need satellites to provide communications, take pictures, relay data over thousands of kilometers, and record thousands of kilometers of footage," she said.

"This requires creativity in areas like physics, in how to use electricity, and in other areas to make sure MAHA [the air force commander] can act in Iran as if it's a first circle country ... We make sure that all of the arms of the IDF can take action where and when they want to," Grosman noted.

But she warned that Iran had also adapted and was constantly making its own adjustments.

The power of AI in war and the need to keep adapting

This led to how rapidly the Communications Command facilitated data sharing over the last almost three years of war.

It was explained to the Post that this war was so dominated by the digital sphere in guiding the invasion maneuvers that it is hard to imagine future wars without these changes.

A major focus of the Communications Command going forward will be adapting to the expected challenges of AI, such as those anticipated for 2035, rather than limiting planning to the situation in 2026.

Combining major developments in cyber, AI, and quantum computing, the Communications Command views the world as entering an extreme period of radical change.

Asked how the IDF can be in a good place with AI, given that, more broadly in Israel, the consensus is that the Jewish state has fallen behind in AI and in building data centers in recent years, IDF officials emphasized the military's unique capacities and context.

According to Grosman, the new AI brigade is evaluating all kinds of IDF technological needs, including data centers, software, and various operational models to deliver solutions on the front lines.

She noted that "Brig.-Gen. B" is the head of the AI brigade, handling service provision, infrastructure, modeling the IDF's current uses and future needs, enhancing AI capabilities, and determining how best to employ data science.

Questioned about how the new division's efforts with AI work clash with efforts in the civilian sector by the Artificial Intelligence Directorate in the Prime Minister's Office, led by former Brig.-Gen. (res.) Erez Askal, IDF officials responded that where the parties can work together, they do, and where they need to keep their work separate, they stay separate.

Cybersecurity: The defense of one's "crown jewels"

Next, the Post questioned IDF sources about whether the military is more challenged in an era when almost anyone can use AI to become a larger and more sophisticated cyber threat.

Grosman agreed with top commercial cybersecurity officials who say they invest significant resources in confronting cyber threats on the digital battlefield before hackers can reach their own cyber perimeters.

The Communications Command wants to know what is happening outside the digital perimeter in order to enable preemptive self-defense.

Expressly, it wants cyber warfare to be conducted in the enemy's digital "territory," rather than in Israel's.

In that sense, internal digital-perimeter cyber defenses are only one element of a broader cyber defense strategy.

A common metaphor used by commercial cybersecurity experts in the past was to recommend fiercely defending a company's technological "crown jewels," even though that is now difficult to do.

Given the IDF's unique technologies, it is likely to effectively defend a sort of "diamond crown jewel" from nation-state hackers.

Why did humanitarian aid fail?

In the field of humanitarian aid to civilians, the Communications Command said that all information assists with a variety of jobs.

These include distributing information, humanitarian concerns for both Israeli and Palestinian civilians, and efficiently distributing warnings to limit threats from Israel's enemies.

IDF sources were pressed about July-August 2025, when top military officials themselves admitted a large-scale series of errors leading to serious food insecurity in parts of Gaza.

This food insecurity was so severe that Israel dropped its months-long limits on food and other aid items, which had been set to try to prevent Hamas from controlling that aid.

They were asked how this food insecurity came about and whether the IDF's data was so accurate regarding humanitarian aid in Gaza.

Responding, the Communications Command said that the data cannot always be analyzed perfectly or applied exactly to the real world.

For example, if Hamas wants to seize humanitarian aid, algorithmic calculations about distributing food aid made back at an IDF base cannot prevent that.

But sources added that the IDF complies with whatever the government's policy is regarding food aid or anything else.

The drone threat

Regarding the drone threat to the IDF, all activity detected by sensors is funneled into a digital data "factory," the Post has learned. Not all anti-drone solutions need to be kinetic, using huge amounts of firepower; softer, more cost-effective power is also available.

According to the Communications Command, combating drones is a complex area of warfare and defense that involves significant data sharing and communications.

Given that the IDF can weave together all sensor data, it can synergize such information.

After three years, the Post learned, the IDF had obtained substantial value from the massive amounts of data reviewed.

The information it has collected from the constant rounds of fighting has enabled the IDF to develop new tools for warfare and analysis.

Case in point, the data can be used to defend against regular drones, FPV drones, and cluster munitions, even though the military has acknowledged that there is not yet a comprehensive answer to combating FPV drones.

On the positive side, Grosman said that “one of the central reasons many soldiers are still alive has been the data collected using AI digital platforms” for analyzing enemy threat patterns, trajectories, and scenarios.

The army does not claim that it has a complete answer to the new FPV remotely, manually, and directly operated drone threat, something which could still take some months or years to solve.

One item that has been years in the making and which the Communications Command is in the process of completing, or may have just completed, is the move of many of its units to a new campus in the Beersheba area.

Portions of the command, other IDF units, and the Israel National Cyber Directorate have been relocating to the area on a rolling basis throughout the 2020s, but large additional moves are expected soon.

According to the Communications Command, the new location in the South will also enhance the IDF’s capabilities in various ways.

On her final day as director of national intelligence Friday, Tulsi Gabbard released damning declassified evidence accusing Dr. Anthony Fauci of causing the COVID-19 pandemic, engaging in a cover-up about the virus’s origins in China and lying to Congress about it. Perhaps most disturbingly, he was assisted by the US intelligence community.

“It’s time you know the truth,” said Gabbard when she released “never-before-seen communications and documents exposing how Dr. Fauci provided millions in US taxpayer dollars to fund dangerous gain-of-function research at the Wuhan lab, worked with politicized elements within the Intelligence Community to suppress the truth about his actions and hide the virus’ lab-leak origins, and lied to Congress while under oath in 2024 ... The tactics used to hide

the truth are straight from the deep state playbook.”

Right on cue, two days after the bombshell release, on Sunday, the Washington Post ran a 9,000-word hit piece accusing Gabbard of taking instructions from a Hindu “cult leader” described in the headline as her “guru.”

It was a gratuitous exercise in guilt-by-association masquerading as an investigation, another tactic straight from the deep state playbook.

Meanwhile, the Washington Post did not publish a word about Gabbard’s Fauci revelations.

Nor, for that matter, did any mainstream outlet on the left.

Fauci protected

The same news organizations that helped cover up the origins of the COVID-19 pandemic, now overwhelmingly believed to have come from a leak from China’s Wuhan Institute of Virology, are still refusing to come clean. On liberal social media platform Bluesky, they’re still talking about wet markets and pangolins.

Meanwhile, Fauci, 85, receives a handsome government pension, holds a prestigious role as “distinguished university professor” at Georgetown University, and is showered with rich awards for “defending science.”

Gabbard’s revelations go some way to explaining the surreal disconnect.

Fauci is protected by the deep state and its tentacles, which extend deep into the media, academia and other reputation-enhancing institutions.

His “close relationships” with the intelligence community “shielded him from scrutiny as he wielded outsized influence,” said Gabbard.

“Fauci was the behind-the-scenes advisor who, alongside his hand-picked so-called experts, pushed the intelligence community to endorse a natural, animal origin to hide his dangerous gain-of-function research that he funded using taxpayer dollars.”

Gabbard, who had to leave the role due to her husband’s illness, did her best to fight for transparency against an array of forces in Washington that regarded her as a loose cannon and sought to shut her out.

But President Trump has installed bulldog Bill Pulte as her interim successor, despite the best efforts of the Senate to expedite the confirmation of Jay Clayton, the former SEC chairman whom Trump has named the next DNI. Trump intervened (ostensibly for another reason) to slow the process, giving Pulte time to look for more bodies.

Paul challenges pardon

Meanwhile, Fauci's nemesis, maverick Republican Sen. Rand Paul, has again sent criminal referrals to the DOJ against Fauci for the 2024 alleged perjury that Gabbard detailed in her Friday dump.

Perhaps more significantly, Paul (R-Ky.) insists the 11-year blanket pardon President Joe Biden issued for Fauci, in his last minutes on his last day in office, should be challenged in court, both because it was signed with an autopen and because of its rare retrospective nature.

Curiously, Fauci's pardon stretches back to the exact date of Hunter Biden's retrospective blanket pardon — January 1, 2014 — and encompasses his oversight of NIH/NIAID funding of gain-of-function research at the Wuhan lab, via the New York-based cut-out EcoHealth Alliance.

The now-defunct EcoHealth was a nonprofit supposedly devoted to predicting future pandemics, situated in a nondescript Manhattan office building. Its enigmatic founder, Peter Daszak, received millions of dollars in various grants from Fauci's outfit, but his biggest donor was the Department of Defense, which gave him more than \$40 million for the purpose of "combating weapons of mass destruction."

Back in August 2021, I was told by a former EcoHealth employee, who requested anonymity, that Daszak had been "approached by the CIA in late 2015" to help access the Wuhan lab, believed to be a Chinese military operation.

Daszak later told House Oversight Committee Chairman James Comer (R-Ky.) that he had been contacted by the CIA and other intelligence agencies, although he didn't say when.

If the intelligence community knew about the dangerous gain-of-function research on bat coronaviruses at Wuhan, did it know about evidence of a potential leak as early as August 2019?

That was the start of a dramatic increase in car traffic around major hospitals in Wuhan, in the late summer and fall of 2019, long before the outbreak was reported to the world.

A Harvard Medical School study published in June 2020 found that aerial images captured by private satellites of five Wuhan hospitals suggested a health crisis was underway at the time.

Traffic and parking lot volume were compared with the same period in 2018. There was "a steep increase in volume starting in August 2019," says the paper, "culminating with a peak in December 2019," the date of the first confirmed COVID-19 case.

Between September and October 2019, five of the six hospitals showed the most traffic, "coinciding with elevated levels of [Chinese search engine] Baidu search queries for the terms 'diarrhea' and 'cough.'"

Iran distraction

Back in the US, in August 2019, an anonymous whistleblower, now known as CIA analyst Eric Ciaramella, lodged the complaint that led to Trump's Ukraine impeachment.

The White House was consumed by the impeachment during the fall and winter of 2019, when the COVID-19 virus started circulating in the US.

Today, the White House is distracted by Iran, so transparency about the role of the intelligence agencies in protecting Fauci and covering up the origins of the pandemic is probably not a priority.

Despite Gabbard and Paul's efforts, there is a distinct possibility that nobody will be held accountable for what Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr. last week called "among the most consequential crimes in human history."

Maybe some secrets are just too terrible to be told.

As Gavin Newsom's governorship enters its final chapter, his eyes are no longer fixed on Sacramento. They are fixed on Washington. More specifically, on the White House.

Like Sauron's obsession with the One Ring, Newsom's political focus has narrowed to one overriding object of desire: the presidency.

That is the only way to understand Newsom's latest economic manifesto, released Friday under the banner of a national billionaires' tax.

This was not merely a policy paper – It was positioning.

Newsom is calling for a national tax on billionaires and Americans worth more than \$100 million.

He wants to end the "tax-free lifestyle loan" — a feature of the current tax code that lets the ultra-wealthy borrow against their stock portfolios while reporting no taxable income, then pass appreciated assets to their children with the gains untaxed.

He wants to rewrite inheritance rules so that the state can take another cut of the trillions that rich people want to give to others.

He wants to create a national public equity fund giving Americans a stake in gains from artificial intelligence.

In plain English, he wants Washington to tax, redistribute and socialize more of the American economy.

Under Newsom's proposal, Washington would not merely regulate successful industries. It would claim an ownership interest in them. Silicon Valley entrepreneurs would build the companies, investors would risk the capital, and the federal government would arrive later demanding a share in the name of "fairness."

Bernie Sanders should be thrilled. Elizabeth Warren should be smiling. And Zohran Mamdani, New York City's newly elected mayor and national face of "democratic socialism," should recognize a politician sprinting to catch up.

- This is not accidental.
- It is adaptation.

For the past year, Newsom's national brand has been built around being the Anti-Trump. Democratic voters wanted a fighter, and Newsom eagerly auditioned — picking fights with red-state governors and becoming the party's loudest prosecutor of the Trump era.

But being Anti-Trump is no longer enough.

The energy inside the Democratic Party is moving left through deep-blue urban centers. New York City has elected Mamdani. Washington, DC, Seattle, Minneapolis, Los Angeles and New York, to name just a few places, are all showing the same trend: The activist left is no longer content to protest outside the Democratic establishment. It is trying to take it over from within.

Newsom sees this.

He sees Mamdani. He sees the DSA-aligned candidates. He sees a party base increasingly animated by class warfare, wealth redistribution and hostility toward traditional capitalism — and low-turnout Democratic primaries delivering it power.

- So Newsom is doing what Newsom does.
- He is pivoting.
- That has defined his political career.
- Not ideology.
- Trajectory.

Newsom's positions move toward whatever lane offers the greatest opportunity for advancement.

In San Francisco, Newsom was the pro-growth mayor to business leaders and the bold champion of same-sex marriage to liberal activists — different pitches, same man, same ambition.

- As governor, the pattern continued.
- More right when the audience required it.
- More left when the moment demanded it.
- Always moving toward the next political opening.

He denounced gerrymandering as a threat to democracy while championing Proposition 50, a Legislature-driven congressional map designed to maximize Democratic seats.

That is Newsom in one sentence: condemning the tactic nationally while marketing it at home.

I remember an earlier model. When Newsom was first running for lieutenant governor, he came down to Orange County to woo business-aligned Republicans and donors. I was with him at events when he made his pitch.

- He was going to be the Democrat who represented Republicans.
- The Democrat who understood business.
- The Democrat willing to challenge party orthodoxy.

He spoke about competitiveness, economic growth and reform. He projected pragmatism, not ideology. That version disappeared almost immediately after Election Day.

Now we are watching the latest re-invention unfold in real time.

Even his handling of California's own wealth tax initiative tells the story. Newsom opposes the state measure headed for the November ballot, but not because he objects to taxing wealth. His complaint is that California is the wrong venue because billionaires can flee.

- His answer is not less confiscatory taxation.
- His answer is a national version they cannot escape.

Newsom does not want to be seen as standing with California billionaires against the left. So within hours, he rolled out a federal alternative that lets him oppose the California initiative while still posing as a champion of wealth redistribution.

- That is not courage.
- That is triangulation.

Newsom has concluded that the road to the Democratic presidential nomination runs through the radical left.

So he is positioning himself accordingly.

Gavin has spent two decades reinventing himself for the next office.

Now he is betting that the next Democratic nominee will not be the candidate who resists the party's socialist turn, but the one who executes it most convincingly – and enthusiastically.

For as the rain comes down, and the snow from heaven, and do not return there, but water the earth, and make it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall My word by that goes forth from My mouth; it shall not return to Me void, but it shall accomplish what I please, and it shall prosper in the thing for which I sent it.”
